Why consider Horizon Europe?

High funding rate

Any legal entity is eligible to participate in Horizon (whether it is eligible for funding or not), This includes Universities Research organisation, Charities, Businesses, Local Authorities, Government Departments and other Public Bodies.

To be eligible for funding, applicants must be established in one of the eligible countries,

- Member States of the European Union, including their outermost regions;
- Overseas Countries and Territories (OCTs) linked to the Member States
- Eligible non-EU countries:
 - Countries associated to Horizon Europe (UK from 1st Jan 2024)
 - Low- and middle-income countries

Consortium Composition:

- At least one independent legal entity established in a Member State; and
- At least two other independent legal entities, each established in different Member States or Associated Countries.

Types of Action



Coordination and support actions (CSA)

Activities contributing to the objectives of the Horizon Europe Programme

Research and innovation actions (RIA)

Activities aiming primarily to **establish new knowledge or to explore the feasibility** of a new or improved technology, product, process, service or solution.

Innovation actions (IA)

Activities directly aimed at **producing plans and arrangements** or designs for new, altered or improved products, processes or services, including prototyping, testing, demonstrating, piloting, large-scale product validation and market replication.

Pre-commercial procurement actions (PCP) and Public procurement of innovative solutions actions (PPI)







This is what the project must deliver

- Expected Outcome
- Scope this provides some insights to approaches or solutions

Expected Outcome: In line with the objectives of the farm to fork strategy for a transition to fair, healthy and environmentally friendly livestock production systems, and of the EU biodiversity strategy for 2030, including the conservation status of certain habitats and species, the successful proposal will help policy makers and other actors to monitor and improve the management of farming and terrestrial wildlife relationships, thus contributing to sustainable agriculture and ecosystem services.

Project results are expected to contribute to all of the following outcomes:

- Innovative and sustainable practices and tools at landscape level to prevent and control negative consequences of interactions between livestock and wild animals to protect wildlife and pastoral/outdoor production systems
- Recommendations/policy advice on optimal management at EU level of wildlife and agro-pastoral systems
- Decision-making process on wildlife management and land planning participated by relevant stakeholders
- Improved coordination across Europe in terms of wildlife management, surveillance and data collection systems

Scope: Agro-pastoral/outdoor livestock farming systems, which include a large number traditional activities in Europe such as grazing systems, mountain livestock farming, transhumance, silvo-pastoral and agroforestry systems, offer beneficial effects not only to animal production, e.g., in case of scarce fodder resources, or to animal welfare, but also to habitat maintenance, carbon sequestration, biodiversity conservation and soil protection.



What do good partners look like?

- Enthusiastic and committed
- Trustworthy and good to work with these are long projects

Refer to the call topic

- Which sectors and disciplines are needed?
- What expertise is needed for the project? Good to have some partners with EU/collaborative experience, especially as coordinator.
- Expert in their area
- Not everyone needs to have the same size role
- Each partner should have a clear and defined purpose

Remember

 Have a good balance of countries and types of organisation and gender representation.



What constitutes a winning consortium?

One that can deliver the expected outcomes and impact within the stated scope and budget (and give the evaluators confidence that they can).

There is no 'typical' or 'model' consortium structure/membership

Common to see universities, big business, small business, research and technology organisations, consultancies, local authorities, national authorities all within the one consortium.

Useful to include **exploitation partners** – someone who is going to take the outputs of the project and actually implement them to show immediate impact.

Useful to include the **end user community**, possibly as an advisory board or associate partners (not direct beneficiaries but costs e.g. travel can be included in 'other costs'), again to demonstrate route to implementation.



Evaluation criteria (RIAs and IAs)

IMPACT

- Credibility of the pathways to achieve the expected outcomes and impacts specified in the work programme, and the likely scale and significance of the contributions due to the project.
- ✓ Suitability and quality of the measures to maximize expected outcomes and impacts, as set out in the dissemination and exploitation plan, including communication activities.

QUALITY AND EFFICIENCY OF THE IMPLEMENTATION

- ✓ Quality and effectiveness of the work plan, assessment of risks, and appropriateness of the effort assigned to work packages, and the resources overall.
- Capacity and role of each participant, and extent to which the consortium as a whole brings together the necessary expertise.

Start with who you know



- Are there people you have worked with before or know with suitable expertise?
- Ask your networks to ask their networks for any information or introductions. It's a small world
- Engage effectively at networking events. Make yourself known and indispensable
- Continue, restart or start engaging at European events, networks and partnership appropriate to your sector
- Some limited <u>Travel grants</u> are available.

Who has been successful in the past?




CORDIS: European Commission website where you can search for past Horizon projects and participants.

All live and completed projects are listed and will show all published results.

Details of the coordinator and the project partners. You can also contact them directly via the website.



How to find partners with a track record of success

Search <u>Cordis</u> using key words for relevant projects already underway

- E.g. searching for 'precision' AND 'agriculture' AND 'GNSS returns 33 projects
- 1st listed is AgriBIT: Artificial intelligence applied to precision farming by the use of GNSS and integrated technologies
- Project coordinator as ENGINEERING -INGEGNERIA INFORMATICA SPA of Italy and gives opportunity to contact them <u>and their partners</u>
- Contact is to the Project Participant, not just a central administrative function.










H2020 UK Co-ordinators

Horizon Europe UK Co-ordinators

Horizon Europe 2021-2023

As we were a Candidate Associated Country during this period we were unable to coordinate any projects.

Many organisations acted as the Co-ordinator up until Grant Agreement stage when they had to relinquish the role to another member as the Association status was not ratified.

Horizon Europe 2024 –2027

For the remainder of the Programme the UK is an Associated Country from 1st January 2024 and now able to co-ordinate projects once more.

We look forward to the UK re-establishing itself as a respected co-ordinator in HEU

Co-ordinator Definition

Innovate

From Article 7 (b) Model Grant Agreement The co-ordinator must:

- monitor that the action is implemented properly
- consortium and the granting authority, submit the deliverables and reports to the granting authority and inform the granting authority about the payments made to the other beneficiaries

(ii) act as the intermediary for all communications between the



(iii) distribute the payments received from the granting authority to the other beneficiaries without unjustified delay

Initially Proposal Development and Submission

Leading the science, taking the initiative, leading some of the WP as well as the administrative management tasks.

Work through the detail of the scope and expected outcome what type of organisation needs to do what matrix management
